

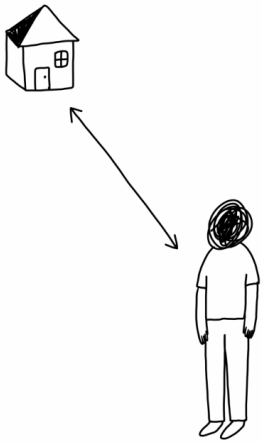
# How do I get my stuff back If there's a Domestic Violence Order?

Sometimes a Domestic Violence Order (DVO) will change where you live, or who you have contact with. This can make it difficult to get your stuff back—for example, if you've left your things at their house. Not all DVOs have conditions that will stop you from getting your things, so you should get legal advice about your situation.

Sometimes you can ask the police if they can help you get your things.

Sometimes the court can make an order so you can safely collect your personal things, like:

- your clothes
- toiletries
- documents like passports, tax returns, birth certificates or other personal papers
- children's toys.

You can get legal advice about this.



If you were in a relationship with the other person, the two of you may need to divide up your things by doing a property settlement. You need to tell the court if you already have family law property orders, or have applied for family law property orders.

When it makes a DVO, the court may order:

- the defendant (the person the order is against) to collect their personal things from the protected person, in the company of a police officer
- the protected person to collect their personal things from the defendant.
