

Can I change, end or extend the Domestic Violence Order?

Domestic Violence Orders are also known as Intervention Orders, Family Violence Orders, Apprehended Domestic Violence Orders or Restraining Orders.



If you want your Domestic Violence Order to last longer, be changed or stopped, it's important to get legal advice about this.

If you want your Domestic Violence Order to last longer, it's important to get legal advice before it expires, as there may be time-limits involved.

In most circumstances, only a court can change a Domestic Violence Order. This includes situations when the protected person and the person who the order is against agree about the Domestic Violence Order being changed.

Breaking or changing a Domestic Violence Order can have serious consequences, so it's important to get legal advice.
